Understanding How Children Are Exploited



Child Exploitation normally follows three stages.



 Recruitment. This can take various forms but can be described as a grooming process. ...



• **Control.** This is an essential element in the process as it establishes the dominance of the perpetrator over the victim. ...




The Six Stages of Grooming



The Six Stages of Grooming

- Targeting a Victim.
- 2. Gaining Trust.
- 3. Filling a Need.
- 4. Isolating the Child.
- 5. Sexual or Criminal Contact.
- 6. Maintaining Control.











The extent of children's use of messaging services:

Nine out of ten children aged between 8-17 are using messenger services.

60% of 8-year-olds and 90% of 12-year-olds reported using a messaging app with an age restriction of 13 or older.



Almost one in ten children report using a messaging service to talk to people they don't already know.



One in six girls aged 14-17 reported having received something distressing from a stranger via a private message.



1 in 20 children say they have shared videos or photos of themselves with strangers.



Over a third of 8-10-year-olds and over half of 11-13-year olds admit that they have said they were older than they were in order to sign up to an online messaging service.



Who is at risk?

Any child can be at risk of being groomed, regardless of age, gender, race or location.



Some children may be more at risk due to other vulnerabilities and disabilities.



For example, Children with SEND (Special Education Needs and Disabilities) could be more at risk if they lack the necessary understanding and education needed to think critically about online contact.



They may also lack the communication skills needed to access support from trusted adults and to use online reporting tools.




Also LBGT children, as some of them turn to the internet to get help.

What is Online Exploitation & Grooming:



Online Exploitation - an individual or a group using online platforms to take advantage of an imbalance of power to coerce, manipulate or deceive a child or young person under the age of 18 into sexual and/or criminal activity that can occur both online and offline.









Online Grooming – The act of developing a relationship with a child to enable their abuse and exploitation both online and offline.

Online platforms, such as online gaming, social media, messaging and live streaming, can be used to do this.

Omegle – Talk to strangers! The Internet is full of cool people; Omegle lets you meet them. When you use Omegle, we pick someone else at random so you can have a one-on-one chat. Pretty self-explanatory why this is so inappropriate and dangerous for children to use!













Hoop - New friends on Snapchat 13+

Connects with <u>Snapchat</u> to allow users to "make new connections" - in other words, meet strangers. Teens link their Snap profiles and enter personal details (age and gender) and choose a few pictures to feature. Then they review images of other users, choosing to "X" those they are not interested in or requesting Snap info for those they are.

Just as with Snapchat streaks, users earn points and gems for activity, like giving out their Snap and logging in daily or viewing videos or taking surveys



Twitch is the world's leading live streaming platform for gamers and the things we love. Watch and chat now with millions of other fans from around the world



Discord is the easiest way to talk over voice, video, and text. Talk, chat, hang out, and stay close with your friends and communities. With the right privacy settings and monitoring, it's easy to use Discord safely. However, there's always a risk when it comes to sites and apps with open chat. The safest way to use **Discord** is to only accept friend requests and participate in private servers with people you already know.












Yellow or Yopo targets guys and girls who are 13- to 17-year-old who are looking to connect with other kids their age. ... Because unlike Tinder, Yellow has no checks in place to verify ages, meaning any stranger can add your child. And vice versa. That means photos can be exchanged — even if two people have never physically met





Reddit is an American social news aggregation, web content rating, and discussion website. Registered members submit content to the site such as links, text posts, images, and videos, which are then voted up or down by other members.






"In this open-world action game, players assume the role of three criminals whose storylines intersect within the fictional city of Los Santos. Players can switch between each character to follow his storyline, completing missions that often include criminal activities (e.g., stealing cars, executing heists, assassinating targets).

The game includes depictions of sexual material/activity: implied fellatio and masturbation; various sex acts that the player's character procures from a prostitute—while no nudity is depicted in these sequences, different sexual moaning sounds can be heard."





Though Common Sense Media recommends the game only for adults or very mature teens, we know lots of younger teens -- and even tweens -- play it.

12+ frequent scenes of mild violence.

Roblox offers parental controls that allow for a selection of chat options (no chat, chat with friends, chat with everyone), account **age** visibility (13+ or <13), an account PIN code feature, and an Account Restrictions setting that only allows children under 13 to access a curated list of **age-appropriate** games



for 7+ up to 13+ depending on which version of the game you are playing.



This is a *game* for kids *ages* 13 and up because it contains very graphic things

PEGI ratings



- PEGI 3- completely clean, nothing offensive
- PEGI 7- can contain non-realistic violence against non-human characters
- PEGI 12- Some swear words allowed. More non-realistic violence towards human characters, however realistic violence allowed towards non-human characters (no blood). Some sexual content allowed.
- PEGI 16- May glamorise crime or use of illegal substances. More offensive swearing allowed. Can show blood and more detailed injury towards human characters
- PEGI 18- As above and also features sexual violence and depictions of sex with visible genitalia. Gross violence including dismemberment, decapitation and torture and can feature motiveless mass killing

What to do:



Children and young people have grown up in an interconnected world. Online and offline experiences are equally real and valid. Talk to young people about being safe online. Let them know they can talk to you about anything they're worried about or experiencing.

Listen to them, don't dismiss their experiences or get angry if they tell you something concerning.

Practical tips:

- Check games content and features (Is it appropriate? Will they have online access?)
- Use privacy and parental controls.
- > Turn location settings off.

What to do:

Make an agreement about use and time online and stick to it.

Talk about:

- ➤ Some people may pretend to be someone else.
- The risks of giving personal data to anyone online (eg address, photo, school, bank details).
- > The danger of meeting up with someone who they met online in the real world.
- Always telling a trusted adult if they are planning to do this and how to be safe.
- ➤ Share the same curiosity for online friends as you would for offline friends.









Reporting grooming



If you are at all concerned by the way someone is behaving towards a child online, particularly if you suspect this person to be an adult, it is important to report it straight away.



Reports can be made to the CEOP who is part of the National Crime Agency.



What is Sexual Exploitation



Sexual exploitation is an act or acts committed through nonconsensual abuse or exploitation of another person's sexuality for the purpose of sexual gratification, financial gain, personal benefit or advantage, or any other non-legitimate purpose.









What is Criminal exploitation:

Criminal exploitation is a form of modern slavery that sees victims being forced to work under the control of highly organised criminals in activities such as forced begging, shoplifting and pickpocketing, cannabis cultivation, drug dealing and financial exploitation

Which children get exploited?

Any child can be sexually or criminally exploited but...



Most children who become victimised have pre-existing vulnerabilities that perpetrators recognise and exploit:



- Unmet emotional need for affection, advocacy and interest;
- > Low self esteem and lack of self-worth
- Compromised sexual boundaries (usually as a result of previous sexual abuse)
- Availability through absence from education or care;
- Conflict with parents or carers
- Existing drug or alcohol abuse
- Risk taking behaviour
- Learning difficulty or disability









The truth about county lines...Shhhhhh

- People involved in county lines....Don't call it "County Lines"!
- If you are going into a major city you say you are "Going long".
- If you are coming from a major city into a place like Margate you are "Going country"
- "Going country" or "going long" CAN mean moving a phone line along. However, it can also be the movement of drugs, weapons and people.
- · How much is your phone worth?
- Drug dealers will rob the people they have sent country to bond them.
- Going country is one of the most profitable jobs within gang culture.
- Almost all young people will have said that they will never "go country", due to how risky it is, before they do.













Drug gangs on 'recruitment drive' during lockdown

Drug gangs have been on a "recruitment drive" during lockdown, targeting vulnerable children and increasingly girls, according to a report.

They are being groomed to carry drugs, because they are unknown to police, the National Youth Agency says. And social media and "unsafe outdoor spaces" are being used to recruit them.

The children's commissioner for England warned with schools and youth clubs closed, thousands of vulnerable young people had "simply gone off the radar". "Lockdown removed many of the usual ways of identifying children at risk of being exploited by gangs,"

The National Youth Agency report, based on responses from youth workers on the ground, is the first detailed examination of drug gangs during lockdown.












Features of 'County Lines'

'County Lines' is not solely a drugs issue as it cross cuts a number of other thematic areas and crime types, including:











Grooming process



Target

- Observing children
- Finding out their vulnerabilities, needs and wants
- Gaining and developing trust
- M anipulating children to recruit them
- Glamorising their lifestyle
- Sharing information with others in the group

Test

- Test out children's loyalty
- Offer them protection
- Give a sense of belonging
- Might create a dependency
- Introduce them to more established members
- Ask for favours
- Ask to recruit others

Trap

- Experiences of physical, sexual and psychological violence
- Trafficking
- Humiliation & control
- Reinforced dependency
- Blackmail
- Debt bondage
- Isolation from family, friends and society

Signs that a young or vulnerable person is being groomed:

- > They have a new group of friends
- Using new language
- Appear to have new clothes, shoes, phones and cash
- > They start to skip school
- > They become secretive
- Their behaviour changes, maybe they have become emotional, withdrawn, aggressive and they start staying out after and later not talking about where they go or who with
- Start to appear with unexplained injuries or you think they may have started carrying a weapon



Who is committing these crimes?

Perpetrators of Child Exploitation may be:

- An adult or another young person
- Male or female
- Any ethnicity
- Visible in everyday life
- Articulate, plausible and 'savvy'
- Gangs
- It is important to note that not all perpetrators of child sexual exploitation will involve money or gifts when they exploit young people.

MYTH

Perpetrators of child sexual exploitation are usually older men.

FACT

There is no typical perpetrator, and CSE is often committed by another young person.

Why children don't tell

- They have felt ashamed or embarrassed.
- They weren't sure how to talk about it or couldn't find a space to.
- They were worried about how other people might respond and what was going to happen.



Behaviours should be our disclosures...

They may have thought:

- 'I might be seen as different.'
- 'This is going to cause problems in my family/community/school.'
- 'I may be taken away from home.'
- 'I don't want the police or social services involved in my life.'
- 'I don't want the abuser to get in trouble' (because of feelings of loyalty, love, fear etc).
- 'I'm going to be blamed.'
- 'Images will be found which I'm embarrassed about.'
- 'I won't be believed.'
- 'I won't be taken seriously.'
- 'He/she is going to hurt or embarrass me or my family or someone else.'
